



companionship with our feline friends.








Lilly was very happy with her cat Anna and Anna's three little kittens. Anna was the cat that had been rescued from the storm-water drain right before she had her kittens.

Mom answered firmly, "Just choose one. Then we'll find good homes for the other three."




That night Lilly prayed, "Please help me decide which kitty to keep."
